Vice-Chancellor's Review:

It is with great pleasure and a sense of pride that I present the Annual Report of University of Colombo for the year 2015.

Despite many difficulties experienced due to inadequacy of funding and shortage of staff of both academic as well as non-academic cadre overall, the University was able to achieve progress in a number of fields during the year 2015.

I am delighted to report that the University of Colombo was ranked as the No. 1 University in Sri Lanka, in the year 2015 by webometric ranking.

A favorable environment prevailed in the University for teaching, learning, research and other related activities. Several Memorandum of Understandings were signed with international universities and agencies for Strengthening academic and related collaborative programmes.

Annual Research Symposium was held successfully in late October at the University premises and few other International Conferences were also organized by the Faculties during the year 2015 in order to disseminate research findings of the academics. The General as well as Postgraduate Convocations were held in July and December 2015 respectively, in a glamorous manner.

In addition to academic achievements, the students were heavily involved in extra- curricular activities such as sports, debates, aesthetic and cultural events and community based extension programmes. The University colors awarding ceremony was held and the students were awarded colors for the Sports activities. Similarly many students won several awards and became champions throughout the year at several sporting events.

I take this opportunity to express my gratitude to the Council, Senate, Registrar, Bursar and all other staff of the University for making 2015 a very productive year.

Highlights - 2015

- The University of Colombo was ranked No. 1 in Sri Lanka, No. 41st in South Asia and 2096th in the World, on the Web Ranking of World Universities carried out in August 2015 by the Cybermetrics Lab, the largest public research body in Spain.
- Senior Professor Lakshman Dissanayake was appointed as the Vice-Chancellor of the University of Colombo with effect from 6th August 2015.
- The Human Genetics Unit (HGU) of the Faculty of Medicine together with John Keells Research (JKR), a unit established by John Keells Holdings PLC (JKH) sequenced the entire genome of *goda* wee an indigenous rice variety successfully. This is the first time that such a feat in the field of science was achieved within Sri Lanka.
- An MOU was signed between The Faculty of Management and Finance and Cinnamon Hotels &
 Resorts together with John Keells Foundation to implement a Bachelor of Business Administration
 (BBA) degree in Hospitality and Leisure Management at the university. This is the first time ever
 that a hotel chain has partnered a university to launch a degree programme of this nature.
- Delegation from Western Sydney University, Australia met Prof. Lakshman Dissanayake, Vice-Chancellor of the University of Colombo on 15th September 2015 in order to discuss on possible Collaborations between the two universities in future.
- The Memorandum of Understanding of the joint research study between Department of Geography, University of Colomboand theIsland Research Center, State Oceanic Administration, P.R. China, was signed on 14th December 2015, by Prof. Lakshman Dissanayake – Vice Chancellor, University of Colombo and Dr. Li Wenjun – Deputy Director General, Island Research Centre, China.
- An MOU was signed between the University of Colombo and the Infrastructure University Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia to exchange faculty and students and to provide the placements for the academics on sabbatical in the fields of Arts and Management and Finance.
- The University of Colombo emerged champions for the 3rd consecutive year at the CFA Research Challenge Sri Lanka 2015 which was held on 6th of November at Ramada, Colombo. The team will be representing Sri Lanka at the Asia Pacific Finals to be held in Chicago, United States of America in 2016.
- A delegation from Sophia University Japan visited the University of Colombo in November 2015. Both parties agreed on starting the student and faculty exchange between the two Universities.
- The regional Director for India, Bangladesh, Nepal, Sri Lanka of German Academic Exchange Service (DAAD) Ms. Heike Mock and Senior Advisor/ International Cooperation Ms. Shikha Sinha visited the University of Colombo in November 2015 to explora further collaborations.
- Annual Research Symposium 2015 was held from 26th -30th October 2015 at the University of Colombo in a grand scale. Prof Tony Anghie, Professor of Law University of Utah, USA and his Excellencey Y K Sinha High Commissioner of India to Sri Lanka were the Keynote Speaker and the Chief Guest respectively.
- The 3rd International Conference on Ayurveda, Unani, Siddha and Traditional Medicine 2015 and AYU EXPO" organized by Institute of Indigenous Medicine, University of Colombo, in collaboration with USERENDIVUS CONFERENCE was held in September 2015.
- The 10th Annual International Conference of the Faculty of the Management & Finance was held in December 2015.
- The International Conference in Information Science ICIS 2015 organized by NILIS was held in Colombo on 13th November, 2015.
- The International Research Conference Faculty of Arts, was held on 03rd 04th December2015, with the intention of providing a valuable platform for scholars in the field of Humanities and Social Sciences to showcase their research work

- The workshop on University Governance, Autonomy and Accountability: Directions for Change was held on 3rd-4th September 2015 at SLFI with the participation of delegates from MOHE, UGC and academics from all Universities in Sri Lanka.
- The University of Colombo Colours Awards Ceremony 2015 was held on 16th November 2015 at the Kinsbury Hotel.
- The University of Colombo women's carrom team won the 2nd runner up & men's carrom team won the 4th place at Grip to Grip 2015 inter University & Institutes carrom tournament organized by the University of Kelaniya held in September 2015
- University of Colombo won the Silver Medal in Government Services A Division Carrom Championship.
- The newly constructed Fitness Centre of the University of Colombo was opened by the Vice-Chancellor Senior Prof. Lakshman Dissanayake in August 2015 at the University of Colombo Gymnasium.
- The General Convocation of the University of Colombo was held on 20th, 21st and 22nd of July 2015 at the BMICH.
- Postgraduate Convocation of the University of Colombo was held at the BMICH on 01st & 2nd December, 2015.
- The Commemoration of the 154th Birth Anniversary of Gurudev Rabindranath Tagore was held on 7th May 2015 in the presence of H. E. Mr. Arindam Bagchi, Deputy High Commissioner of India, Colombo garland at the Main Library of the University of Colombo.
- University of Colombo FOS media has done the first ever e –radio station in April 2015 as "UOC RHYTHM".
- Vidya Jyothi Prof. V. K. Samaranayake memorial oration was held at the BMICH in September 2015. The oration on "The quality of education issues of technological change and the responsibilities of the university" was delivered by Deshamanya MDD Pieris.
- The Center for Data Science affiliated to the Department of Statistics was established with the purpose of carrying out research and development in the emerging area of Data Science.
- The Department of History, University of Colombo, in partnership with Facilitating Initiatives for Social Cohesion and Transformation (GIZ-FLICT) and the American Institute for Sri Lanka Studies (AISLS), hosted an inaugural three day residential workshop for young academic historians from a number of leading universities in Sri Lanka.
- A delegation from Jinan University, China met the Vice Chancellor Prof. Lakshman Dissanayake and senior academics of University of Colombo in December 2015.
- Mr. Asiri Wijesinghe from the UCSC won a Merit Award for this final year individual project at the
 Asia Pacific ICT Awards 2015. His project is Autogenous Diabetic Retinopathy Censor for
 Ophthalmologists "AKSHI" a full-fledged system for classifying severity level of Diabetic
 Retinopathy (based on retinal lesions) and detecting retinal vascular network to assessment of
 vessel tortuousness to identify abnormal vessels in human retina.




1.5 OVERALL PERFORMANCE

In 2015 the University continued to deliver its academic activities through seven faculties and 48 departments of study.

The University of Colombo marched towards its goals with the assistance of 1418 staff members comprising 45% academic, 3 % administrative and 52% as non-academic staff (figure I-O1)



The proportional distribution of the academic staff among Senior Professors, Professors, Associate Professors, Senior Lecturers and Lecturers were 5%,18%,5%,60% and 12% respectively (Figure I-02)



Academic Performance

The University of Colombo with a proud history of over 143 years continues in its endeavour to meet the challenges of maintaining its position as a "Metropolitan University, Modern and International in Outlook and Character". The location of the University affords the student population all the advantages of a "Metropolitan University", with easy access to international information/resource centres, libraries, theatres, sports complexes etc. Its central location within the City of Colombo provides easy access to a wide range of cultural, entertainment and business facilities. Backed by its long and proud history, together with a solid academic and administrative infrastructure which has stood the test of time, the University has progressed towards its goals in accordance with the Performance Improvement Strategic Plan (PISP) by embracing modern and innovative approaches to teaching, research and service to the community. The University of Colombo has a multi-cultural, multi-ethnic, multi- religious student and staff population fostering social harmony, cultural diversity, equal opportunity and unity. The faculties, campus, institutes and school of the university functioned very smoothly in a conductive environment for teaching, learning and research without any interruption during the year under review.

2. FACULTIES, CAMPUS, CENTERS AND UNITS

2.1 FACULTY OF ARTS

Introduction

The Faculty of Arts, located between the Reid Avenue and Prof. Stanley Wijesundara Mawatha, is the largest Faculty in terms of student population. The Faculty has nine academic Departments comprising the Departments of Demography, Economics, English, Geography, History, International Relations, Political Science & Public Policy, Sinhala and Sociology. In addition, Faculty has six Teaching Units comprising Arabic & Islamic Civilization Unit, English Language Teaching Unit, Computer Unit (comprising the Student Computer Unit and the Computer Teaching Unit), Journalism Unit, Mathematics Unit and Pali & Buddhist Studies Unit. The English Language Teaching Unit serves all six faculties offering undergraduate programs. These Departments and Units offer courses in the Humanities and Social Sciences. Apart from undergraduate BA programme of Study, several Departments offer extension programs and Postgraduate programme leading to Masters, MPhil and Ph.D. degrees. Many students, who successfully complete the four year BA degree programs, eventually register for postgraduate degree programs offered by these Departments of the Faculty.

During the year 2015, Prof Athula Ranasinghe has been re-elected as the Dean of the Faculty of Arts after completing his first three year term. Mr R. Logendra continued as the Senior Assistant Registrar of the Faculty. During the year the following teachers functioned as Heads of Departments. Dr. Sunethra Perera (Demography); Prof. Rev. W. Wimalarathana Thero (Economics); Dr. D. Mendis until 14.11.2015 and Prof. Neloufer De Mel from 15.11.2015 (English); Prof. S.A. Norbert until 15.01.2015 and Prof. Lasantha Manawdu from 16.01.2015 (Geography), Dr. D.N.N.R. Dewasiri until 28.09.2015 and Dr. Nirmalie Wijegunawaradane from 29.09.2015 (History); Prof. Nayani Melegoda (Department of International Relations); Mr. Mahesh Senanayake (Political Science & Public Policy); Prof. Ven. Agalakada Sirisumana Thero (Sinhala); and Dr. Chandani Liayanage (Sociology).

The following teachers functioned as Co-ordinators of Units; Mr. M.M.M. Sabir (Arabic & Islamic Civilization Unit); Ms. S. Illangakoon until 30.09.2015 and Ms. S.Y. Dias (English language Teaching Unit), Prof. Samantha Herath (Journalism Unit); Prof. L. Manawadu (Computer Unit); Dr. D.D.P.M. Dunusinghe (Mathematics Unit); and Prof. Asanga Thilakarathna (Pali & Buddhist Studies Unit).

Mission of the Faculty

The Mission of the Faculty is "to promote collectively scholarships, critical inquiry, competencies and skills in the Social Sciences and Humanities in keeping with the highest academic and ethical standards in teaching, research, training and evaluation. To provide students with not only specific skills and competencies but also a broad social and humanistic orientation, so that they could fit into the changing world of work with a sense of social responsibility and moral commitment".

Major Events of the Faculty of Arts -2015

The second International Conference of the Faculty of Arts on theme "Changing Socio-Economic Dynamics in Sri Lanka: Contexts, Cultures and Imaginations" was held on 03rd - 04th December 2015. The conference was opened to academics and postgraduate students from the Faculty of Arts, University of Colombo as well as the contributors from outside the University of Colombo, including internal participants and 90 papers were presented in the conference. Prof. Naren Chitty from the Macquarie University, Sydney, Australia delivered the keynote address on the topic "Soft power, civic virtue and world politics –contexts, cultures and imaginations", and Prof. Rohan Bastin, from the Deakin University, New Delhi, India was the guest speaker who delivered his speech on the topic "it's 2015:Rethinking the social formation in a Neoliberal Context".

The Faculty of Arts Annual Review Workshop was held on 7th and 8th April 2015 at Club Palm Bay Hotel, Marawila. The discussions were under four key areas pertaining to the Development of the Faculty. The areas under discussions were Academic Development, Student affairs, Financial Development and Issues and Environment and Infrastructure Development. Prof. Kalyani Perera of the University of Peradeniya, who was the Guest Speaker, addressed the Faculty staff on the proposed study streams which was introduced to enhance the development of Students. The workshop was also evaluated the present needs of the Faculty and the progress made from the decisions of the previous workshop.

A festival of sports in order to build closer relations among students from different years and different ethno-religious groups and the faculty was held on 16thJuly 2015 at the University grounds. This event is designed to provide an opportunity in the largest faculty of the University of Colombo to come together in an informal atmosphere. In addition to that, Faculty of Arts organized a cultural performance festival "Divyaradhana" (දිව්යාරාධනා), aimed at enhancing mutual understanding and camaraderie among the student community of the University, strengthening meaningful relations between lecturers and students and improving the aesthetic sense and creativity of undergraduates. This cultural festival was held on 17th of July 2015 at the New Arts Theatre, University of Colombo.

The opening ceremony of the Computer Lab and the Language Lab which was funded by the World Bank through the Innovatory Development Grant for Arts Students (IDAS) Project, and the elevator of the New Arts Building in the Faculty of Arts, was held on 30th September, 2015.

The 5th Annual Research Symposium was held on 03rd November 2015 from 8.00 am onwards at M. B. Ariyapala Auditorium, Department of Sinhala. The keynote address was delivered by Senior Professor Raj Somadewa, Post Graduate Institute of Archaeology, University of Kelaniya. The main theme of this symposium was "New Trends in Sinhala Literature, Language and Cultural Studies". Selected Research papers were presented in this event. The 4th Annual Research Journal of the Department was also launched at the event.

The Department of Demography, Faculty of Arts, organized the Annual Research Symposium under the theme of "Population Dynamics and the Post 2015 Development Agenda" on 10th December, 2015. This research symposium was a great opportunity to academics and postgraduate students to demonstrate their research capabilities and to share their research findings. Papers were presented under the sub themes of Fertility and Reproductive Health, Population and Health, Migration and Urbanization, Population Ageing and Long Term Care, Interdisciplinary Studies, Environment and Development.

The Department of Sociology is one of the oldest and largest departments in the Faculty of Arts of the University of Colombo. The current head and staff organized a series of events celebrating 45 years of the department's growth and development that was highlighted the importance of the discipline of sociology for contemporary social economic and political engagement and active citizenship. The events were also raised awareness regarding the department and its activities within the university and with interested stakeholders within the city of Colombo.

Department of Geography, University of Colombo organized an educational exhibition on 05thJune, 2015, to celebrate the World Environment Day - 2015, with the collaboration of Central Environmental Authority, Department of Wild Life and Department of Forestry. Approximately, 2000 students, from both University and the Schools in the vicinity, participated in this event. In addition, there was a Lecture and a Discussion on "Contemporary Environment Issues", headed by Prof. Devaka Weerakoon, Department of Zoology, Faculty of Science, University of Colombo, with the participation of students. This exhibition was very useful and received by students and respective teachers, who follow Geography and Environmental Studies as a subject. This was a great opportunity to feel the importance of our environment and safeguard them for our future generation.

The students and academic staff exchange programme between Department of English and the Institut fur Anglistik, Justus Liebig University, Germany was successfully continued in 2015. In addition to the student exchange programme, a seven member team from the Institut fur Anglistik, Justus Liebig University visited Sri Lanka from 25^{th} July -11^{th} August 2015 on a linguistic field work excursion.

The Annual Arts Festival - "Esala Sathsara" which was organized by the Faculty of Arts, was held from 16th November 2015 in the faculty premises in two session. This festival was annually organized to identify and develop the various talents of the undergraduates, especially focusing on the first year students. The first session which was held from 16th November to 19th November 2015, compromised of competitions. There were singing and dancing competitions on 16th

November, and the Essay competitions and the Art competition were held on 17th November 2015, and the Drama competition was held on the following day. The Debating competition was held on 19th November 2015. The second session of the "Esala Sathsara" programme began from 30th November - 07th December 2015, and compromised of a film festival, an exhibition of paintings, a cultural festival and musical programmes. This Annual Arts Festival was concluded with a prize awarding ceremony on 07th December 2015.

The Dean's Award, Literary Competition was held in parallel to the "Esala Sathsara" cultural festival. The competition was held by covering various fields such as fictions, short stories, lyrics, poetry, literature criticism, and short drama scripts. The certificates and awards were presented to twenty three students after evaluating their performances in the above fields.

Department of Economics conducted the Japan – Sri Lanka study forum from 19th December 2015 to 25th December 2015. MOU was signed between Department of Economics and South Western University of China to exchange 10 students both undergraduate and postgraduate levels.

The Department of International Relations organized an event to celebrate UN day and Sri Lanka being in UN for 60 years in 14th December 2015 with the participation of Mr. Alain Sibenaler Country Director of UNFPA. 2nd, 3rd and final year students discussed the UN and Sri Lanka relations in three panels. The event was a huge success with over 300 students participation.

Faculty Appointments

Dr. Shermal Wijewardene attached to the Department of English has step down from the post of Director of Studies after providing a commendable service. Dr. Kumudika Boyagoda attached to the Department of Demography was appointed as the Director of Studies, with effect from 19.06.2015.

Undergraduate Programs

In the year 2015, the total undergraduate population in the Faculty of Arts numbered around 2584 students. The academic activities for the new batch (2013- A/L) commenced on 11th May 2015 enrolling about 690 students. The course unit system is continued by offering a range of course units (500) to students including internship component for credit.

Faculty of Arts intoduced the study streams for those who opt for three year degree at the Faculty from May 2015. A study stream is a streamlined and closely targeted selection of subject – specific course units offered by department / unit in the Faculty. The study stream concept aims to strengthen the connection between Departments and General Degree students to enhance a mutual sense of ownership and belonging.

The Department of Demography offered courses for General and Special Degree students. The Department continued to offer Demography as a subject for the General Degree and as a second and third subject for other Special Degree students. The Department introduced applied Demography study stream in year 2015. Three months internship programme was conducted by the Department for the 4th year undergraduates.

The Department of Economics continued to offer the Special Degree Programme in Economics and the General Degree programme. All final year students of the Special Degree Programme in Economics were attached to different public and private institutions for a period of three months to undergo an internship Training programme.

The Department of Englishcontinued tooffer a range of course units for the General and Special Degrees in English Literature, English Language and ELT, and Cultural Studies. The Department commenced teaching the first year courses under the new study stream of courses titled English Studies: Theory & Practice.

The Department of Geography & History continued to offer courses for General and Special Degree students in year 2015 also.

The Department of International Relations offers General and Special Degree courses. It has become one of the most sought subjects by the first year undergraduates. In 2015, the study stream on conflict analysis and sustainable peace was introduced.

The Department of Political Science & Public Policy continued to offer courses for General & Special Degree students and Department of Sinhala also offered courses for General & Special Degree students.

The Department of Sociology offered a Special Degree program in Sociology as well as Sociology as a subject for the General Degree programme. The Department has four major inter-related disciplines such as Sociology, Anthropology, Psychology and Social Work.

Pali & Buddhist Studies unit offered three major study programs for the undergraduates: Buddhist Studies (General Degree), Buddhist Studies (Special Degree), Pali Studies (General Degree).

In the year 2015 also, the English Language Teaching Unit, continued to serve all six faculties (offering undergraduate courses) except FGS of the University of Colombo with intensive and ongoing courses. The ELTU under the study streams developed "Studies in English as a second language" as a first, second or third subject for the General Degree.

Arabic & Islamic Civilization Unit (ICV Unit) in the year 2015 was strengthened by developing its infrastructure facilities in order to give better teaching and learning experience for its undergraduates.

The Journalism Unit was engaged in a syllabus review in the year 2015 also in order to offer Special degree programs in the near future and also for the establishing as a separate Department.

Mathematics is an interdisciplinary subject for various disciplines and the Mathematics Unit (MU) offered three course units for students of the Faculty of Arts.

Computer teaching unit offered two new course units in Sinhala & Tamil Language for the undergraduates for the year 2015. In addition, two foundation course units in tamil for Sinhala speaking students and Sinhala for Tamil speaking students respectively were offered from 2015.

Extension Courses and Community Service Delivery Programmes -2015

As in the previous years, a number of Extension Courses were offered by the Faculty of Arts during 2015, providing professional enhancement skills to the community at large and enabling the Faculty to remain the largest contributor to the University Development Fund.

The Department of Economics offered three diploma courses: A Diploma in Tourism and Travel Economics and Hotel Management, Executive Diploma in Business and Financial Economics and a Diploma in Micro Finance. In addition to the above, Department of Economics commenced a Certificate Course: Certificate for English for Economics.

The Department of English offered Extension Courses in English catering to about 1000 members of the general public, and undertook consultancies to various government and private institutions. It offered Certificate Courses in English for Careers (Part 1 & 2), Diploma courses in Advanced English for Administrative and Academic Purposes, and English for Teachers of English (DETE) and a Diploma in English for English Medium Instruction Teachers (DEEMIT).

The Department of International Relations offered two extension course titled Certificate Course in International Relations (CCIR) and Certificate Course in Conflict, Peace and Reconciliation (CPR) in year 2015.

The Department of Political Science and Public Policy continued its Certificate programme "Certificate Course in Politics and Governance" in year 2015 also.

The Department of Sinhala also continued its Diploma Programme "Diploma in Sinhala" in year 2015 and Department commenced new Certificate Course titled: Certificate Course in Sinhala Language, targeting the foreigners.

The ELTU offered Certificate Courses in Business English (Preliminary and Intermediate Levels), and e-Diploma in Business English in M-learning platform.

The Journalism Unit conducted its Diploma in Journalism programme for the year 2015 also.

The Dean's office continued to offer Certificate Course in Spoken Tamil, short term (04 months programme)

The Department of Demography continued its one year Programme of Master of Arts in Demography in year 2015 and commenced the programme for new batch on 06th November 2015. The Department of Economics offered the M.Phil/ Ph.D in Economics, MA in Economics, MA in Financial Economics, Post- Graduate Diploma in Economic Development (DED) program and Masters & Postgraduate Diploma in Tourism Economics & Hotel Management.

The Department of English continued its Postgraduate programme- the MA in English Studies in year 2015,. The Department of Geography offered Postgraduate Diploma in Environment and Regional Development Programme in year 2015 also. The Department of History offered a Post Graduate Research Degrees in History (PhD, MA & MPhil).

The Department of International Relations also offered the Masters in International Relations (MAIR) and M.Phil in International Relations (by research). The Department of Political Science and Public Policy conducted programs towards the MA by research. The Department of Sinhala also offered the Masters in Sinhala Programme in year 2015.

The Department of Sociology conducted three postgraduate programs: Post-graduate Diploma in Applied Sociology, M.Phil in Sociology programs and MA in Sociology during the year 2015.Postgraduate programms are yet to be begun at the Pali & Buddhist studies unit.

2.3 FACULTY OF GRADUATE STUDIES

The FGS of the University of Colombo is one of the leading postgraduate degree awarding institutions in Sri Lanka. With the introduction of liberalized policies in 1977, the market for higher education has changed significantly. In fact, a bachelor's degree is now considered a basic qualification for academic or employment prospects and postgraduate training has become an essential component of career development.

The FGS was established by the Faculty of Graduate Studies Ordinance No: 03 of 1987. It is headed by the Dean of the Faculty, and managed by the Board of Graduate Studies, accountable to the Senate and the Council of the University of Colombo. The Boards of studies constituted under the ordinance, the Board of Study for Development Studies and the Board of Study for Professional Studies function as the first layer of policy making and forward their recommendations to the Faculty Board for approval. 



The introduction of online teaching in 2007 was a major step towards offering greater flexibility to students in terms of selection of courses, their duration, new methods of teaching, learning and evaluation.

The other important development was the continuation of highly structured M Phil/ Ph D programme for the 9thtime in 2015for the benefit students interested in multi-disciplinary studies.

The FGS conducted four (04) Executive Diplomas and thirteen (13) Postgraduate Diploma programmes and thirteen (13) Masters programmes and two (02) MPhil/PhD programmes during the year under review. The Faculty continuedits Postgraduate Diploma in Gender and Women's Studies programme and restructured its PgDGWS degree programme.

Quality enhancement is one of the key priorities of the Faculty and two (02) strategies have been adopted to realize this objective

- curriculum development by revising and updating existing study programmes,
- provide knowledge inputs to students through well qualified staff drawn from the university and industry

These strategies also strengthen the linkage between university and industry. In 2015, the FGS managed to maintain its student enrolment levels in spite of competitive pressures from public and private sector service providers.

2.3.2 Student Profile

The total enrolment in 2015was 1312representing MPhil/PhD, Masters, Postgraduate Diplomas and Executive Diploma programmes. The total graduate output during the year under review was 621 graduands.

In 1994, the dream come true and Faculty of Management & Finance was established with two academic departments namely Department of Commerce and the Department of Management Studies and remain as the growing faculty of the University of Colombo.


Again, in 2008, six new Departments were established. In altogether seven Departments are offering eight degrees namely Bachelor of Business Administration, Bachelor of Business administration in Accounting, Bachelor of Business administration inHuman Resource Management, Bachelor of Business administration in Finance, Bachelor of Business Administration in Business Economics, Bachelor of Business administration in Marketing, Bachelor of Business administration in International Business, Bachelor of Business administration in Hospitality and Leisure Management. In addition to that we offer MBA as well as MPhil/PhDs and many Diplomas.

At the moment the faculty is undergoing another major revision of programmes and restructuring faculty to get ready to meet new challenges and capitalized opportunities in the new globalized economy.

The curriculum of programmes offered by the Faculty consists of a fine teaching/learning exposure to the real business world. The programmes offered by the Faculty are regularly updated to suit with the industry requirements and to incorporate the contemporary developments in the discipline. The

programmes of the Faculty are mutually beneficial and collaboratively link with the industry. The increasing demand of programmes could be witnessed by increasing Z score requirements to secure a plan and the increasing number of foreign students' enrollment for both undergraduate and postgraduate programmes. The Faculty has developed a strategic plan in 2015 for next five years and the main objectives are:

- To promote research collaborations and partnerships within and outside the country for maximizing common aspirations and priorities.

The strength of Faculty of Management & Finance is the excellent teaching panel with the highly recognized PhDs who are from local as well as international well recognized Universities covering multidisciplinary aspects of Management.

The students of faculty of Management &Finance, plan their career path starting from getting good picture theoretical of knowledge and industrial training and earn more credits from extracurricular activities.

Career Guidance Unit

The establishment of a Career Guidance Unit (CGU) within the Faculty of Management and Finance results from the clear necessity of proactively coaching our undergraduates to be competitive in the labour market by bridging the gap between the labour market requirements and the competencies of undergraduates/immediate graduates.

The Unit begins attaining aforesaid aim by formalizing and administering the Industrial Training Programme of the Faculty which is part of the curriculum in Level II Semester VIII. Here, the role of the CGU is vital with the responsibilities for finding internship placements annually to the entire batch, coordinating the Industrial Training Programme including its evaluation procedure and acting as a liaison between the undergraduates and the industry. The CGU does not look upon finding internships for the undergraduates as the boundary of its responsibility, but continues its endeavors to ensure that all the immediate graduates secure permanent employment in well established organizations.

In addition to the key task stated above, this unit passionately looks forward to forging and sustaining mutually beneficial collaborations with organizations in the private, public, and non-governmental organization (NGO) sectors. Such collaboration would be forged through a number of interventions including, but not limited to, conducting assessment centers, organizing an annual career fair, bringing the corporate sector experts to dialogue with undergraduates and the academic staff on producing employable graduates, and promoting joint research with corporate sector organizations on career guidance and career counseling.

2.6 FACULTY OF MEDICINE

Introduction

The Faculty of Medicine is the second oldest medical school in South Asia and the forerunner of university education in this country. Faculty of Medicine continues have close links with the main teaching hospitals of the Ministry of Health where medical students and postgraduates train. Academics of the Faculty provide full-time consultant clinical services to several wards and clinics to over 50,000 patients annually in these hospitals, namely the National Hospital of Sri Lanka, the Lady Ridgeway Children's Hospital, and the De Soysa Maternity Hospital. Several Departments provide high quality medical laboratory and genetic services to the Ministry of Health, and the general public. Deapartment of Forensic Medicine and Toxicology performes judicial work within six designated police areas in Colombo and any relevant cases by a court of law from anywhere in the country. The Department of Community medicine take part in the delivery of healthcare services in the University Community Health Project in the Kotte MOH area.

The Faculty has 137 members on the permanent academic staff, comprising of six Senior Professors, thirty two Professors, fifty four Senior Lecturers, fourty four Lecturers and Research Officer. The extended Faculty included about ninety (90) Consultants in the National Hospital of Sri Lanka, the Lady Ridgeway Children's Hospital. the De Soysa Maternity Hospital, Castle Street Hospital for Women, Judicial Medical Officers in Colombo, Consultants and Medical Officers of the Chest Hospital Welisara, Rehabilitation Hospital Ragama, National Cancer Institute, Maharagama, Medical Officers at District Hospitals, Peripheral Units, and Municipal Dispensaries, Medical Officers of Health and about fourteen (14) General Practitioners.

At present there are 16 departments. The Departments of Biochemistry and Pharmacology ranched off from the Department of Physiology, Parasitology and Microbiology from the Department of Pathology, and Paediatrics and Psychological Medicine from the Department of Medicine. There are 5 Units in addition to these departments - the Parasitic Diseases Research Unit, the Human Genetics Unit, the Molecular Biology Unit, the Curriculum Implementation Unit, the Publications Unit and the Audio-Visual Unit.

One hundred and ninety eight (198) medical students from the 2014 A/L batch and twenty six (26) Physiotherapy students from the 2013 A/L batch began their undergraduate programmes on 30th November and 9th March,, 2015 respectively. This includes eight (08) foreign Medical undergraduates who joined under the MOU between the Faculty of Medicine & the Royal Government of Bhutan and under the foreign quota. The Department of Pharmacology conducts the B.Sc. (Pharmacy) special degree programme is collaboration with the Science Faculty of the University.

The Faculty conducts several extension courses such as MSc in Biochemistry, Molecular Biology & Gene Technology, Diploma in Forensic Medicine & Science, Diploma in Pharmacy, Postgraduate Diploma in Occupational Health & Safety and Postgraduate Diploma in Health Development.

In addition to training medical graduates, the Faculty plays an important role in training paramedical staff by participating in the training programmes of the School of Radiography, School of Physiotherapy and Occupational Therapy, School of Cardiography, Optometrists Training Programme, Nurses Training Schools, and the Post Basic Nurses Training School. The Department of Pharmacology conducts the Internal Pharmacy course for the Ministry of Health and assists the Ceylon Medical College Council by conducting the External Pharmacy Examination.

We attract over Eighty (80) foreign elective students annually from the countries as listed in the following table and attended elective programmes in the departments of Clinical Medicine, Paediatrics, Surgery, Obstetrics & Gynaecology, Community Medicine, Parasitology and Forensic Medicine as at 31st December, 2015, which illustrates the prestigious position of the Faculty and is a source of revenue generation.

The Faculty of Medicine continued under the Deanship of Professor J Perera who was elected as the Dean of the Faculty on 20th February, 2015. Mr. PMS Bandara, and Ms. RAVS Perera, continued as Deputy Registrar and Senior Assistant Bursar respectively whilst Mr. NS Talagune, Assistant Registrar worked until 17th December who left the Faculty on 18th December, 2015 with his promotion.

With a student population of over one thousand three hundred and seventy four (1,374), and academic and non-academic staff amounting to about three hundred and eighty (380), space is an acute problem in the Faculty. The Department of Allied Health Sciences which conduct the B.Sc. Physiotherapy programme, is located away from the Faculty premises in a rented house. However, construction works of the second stage of the Pre-Clinical Building which started in April, 2014 and expected to complete before 30th of May, 2016 and initiatives are being taken to start the final stage towards the latter part of the year 2016.

Vision Statement

Mission Statement

To articulate and promote interaction with public and private sector and society at large, with the view to contributing towards the development of the nation. To institute mechanism for partnership programs for improving resources and infrastructure facilities.

Achievements

Prof. K.R.R.Mahanama served as the Dean of the Faculty of Science and the Faculty has successfully carried out its academic activities during the year under review.

2015 student intake was 433 from all 4 streams of Physical science, Biological sciences, Biochemistry & Molecular Biology and Industrial Statistics & Mathematical Finance. Undergraduates and Postgraduate output of the faculty during the year 2015 was 227 & 184 respectively. Three foreign students were admitted to the faculty under the Government of Sri Lanka Presidential Scholarships for Foreign Students 2014/15, during the year under review.

Faculty was able to conduct several Curriculum Development Workshops with the participation of the Industry expertise during this year. The Faculty was also able to introduce three more 4G themes to the curricular during 2015 which in turn makes the total number of eight 4G themes. The Faculty research sessions in line with the Annual Research Symposium of the University was successfully held during the year 2015 under three different sessions, Biological Sciences, Chemical Sciences and Physical Sciences and 35 abstracts on postgraduate research were presented.

Two External Degree Programs, B.Sc. in Financial Engineering and B.Sc. in Electronics and Automation Technologies was successfully carried out during the year 2015.

Postgraduate Student Information System – PG SiS was successfully developed and executed during 2015. Department of Statistics of the Faculty of Science established Centre for Data Science. The Faculty also took an initiative to establish Student Enterprise Development Centre (SEDC) under HETC – QIG/W3. Research and Development Center for Mathematical Modelling of the Department of Mathematics held its second International Forum for Mathematical Modeling during the year 2015.

The Faculty was also able to take initiatives to commence Sinhala and Tamil Language Training Courses for the first year students during their orientation which will be held in January 2016 with the cooperation from the Department of National Languages.

A Large number of Academic Staff and students of the faculty won awards, medals at numerous prestigious award ceremonies nationally and internationally during the year 2015. Thirty faculty domain coordinators of the Self Evaluation Report – SER, successfully completed faculty report in 2015. Quality Assurance Cell of the faculty was re-activated in the year 2015 and the faculty wasable to set up a question bank to conduct on-line assessments with the contributions made by all seven departments.

The Faculty recommended to award an Honorary Doctorate to Prof. GV Coorey of Uppsala University, Sweden considering his service rendered to the Department of Physics.

2.8 SRI PALEE CAMPUS

2.9 STAFF DEVELOPMENT CENTRE

Introduction.

The Staff Development Centre (SDC), University of Colombo has successfully completed its eighteenth year since its inception. The Staff Development Centre of the University of Colombo was launched in 1997 as the first SDC in national university system in Sri Lanka, due to a need to commence and establish planned staff development in Sri Lankan universities.

The Mission of the Staff Development Centre (SDC) is "to enhance the quality of academic works undertaken by staff and students within the system of higher education in Sri Lanka, in general, and within the University of Colombo, in particular". In order to achieve this objective the SDC would try to make university teaching/learning more effective, more relevant, student oriented and of internationally high standard. It will try to develop skills and competencies necessary for more effective and efficient performance among all members of the staff of the University including academic and non-academic staff. It will also carry out any related training

programmes/workshops that can make career development of the staff under the given financial and human resource limitations. To achieve these, the Staff Development Centre of University of Colombo was launched in 1997 as the very first SDC in Sri Lanka, due to a need to commence and establish a well-planned staff development centre in Sri Lankan universities.

Objectives and Expected Activities of SDC¹

- 2.4 To provide support and assistance to academic staff in developing and enhancing thevarious skills needed to fulfill academic tasks like preparation and reform of curriculum, teaching and research.
- 2.5 To provide support and assistance to non-academic staff in developing and enhancing the skills needed to fulfill various academic support services and activities.
- 2.6 To provide support and assistance to academic staff already in academic administrative positions (Heads of Departments, Deans of Faculties, Directors of Institutes and School, Rector etc.) or aspiring to take up such positions to acquire the skills and competencies required in the performance of academic administration
- 2.7 To provide support to individuals and groups in the evaluation and review of teaching departments and other academic units, courses and programmes, and faculties.
- 2.8 To collaborate with individuals and groups throughout the University on projects which aim to enhance the quality of teaching and learning in the University
- 2.9 .To provide to teachers objective student feedback services on request.
- 2.10 To contribute to the policies and general procedures within the University which relates to teaching and learning.
- 2.11 To contribute to the wider field of research and scholarship related to higher education.
- 2.12 To undertake publications in the areas of university staff development in general, and teaching and learning in particular, to be used within the University of Colombo and other institutions of higher learning.
- 2.13 To develop linkages among domestic and foreign university staff development organizations with similar objectives.
- 2.14 To raise funds through domestic and foreign sources, with the approval of the University Council, to carry out its activities, if resources placed at its disposal by the University are found inadequate.
- 2.15 To build up a resource and information centre in subject related to university course structures, curriculum changes, methodology of university teaching and learning and research

In order to achieve these objectives, the SDC is to enhance and to improve the university teaching/learning more effective, more relevant, student oriented and of internationally high standards. Accordingly the SDC is to develop skills and competencies necessary for more effective and efficient performance among all members of the staff of the University.

The main regular course aimed at the academic staff is CTHE (Certificate of Teaching in Higher Education) which is accredited by Staff and Educational Development Association (UK) as well as by the University Grant Commission of Sri Lanka. In addition, SDC conducts periodical workshops for

both academics and non-academics. The short courses/workshops in making more effective teaching and other related services are offered to all categories of staff members of the university. The SDC operates from its office complex in the University of Colombo. Colombo University SDC has been in operation for more than 18 years with its excellence to bring the University of Colombo to global heights in education industry.

Currently, the SDC is successfully continuing its contribution to develop university education in an array of well-focused and diversified training programmes targeting all academic, administrative and other supportive staff members of the university.

The SDC of University of Colombo is making its significant contribution to enhance and to improve the capacity of academic and non-academic staff of not only University of Colombo but also other universities/institutes in Sri Lanka. During the year 2015 the SDC could successfully trained more than 848 university staff members in all categories altogether.

Staff Development Programmes

Certificate in Teaching in Higher Education (CTHE) Course

The eighteenth iteration of the Certificate in Teaching in Higher Education (CTHE) course was successfully completed by the SDC for University Staff, and was followed by 32 academics from different universities in Sri Lanka.

Short Course in Making Teaching Effective (MaTE 2015)

Short Course in Making Teaching Effective (MaTE 2015) was conducted targeting the temporary junior academic staff (e.g. Tutors, Demonstrators) of the University of Colombo. This course attracted permeant academic staff from University of Moratuwa and National Institute of Social Development also.

Conference on "Outcome-based Higher Education: Achievements, Challenges and Potential"

The eleventh annual conference on educational development on the theme "Outcome-Based Higher Education Achievements, Challenges and Potential" was held on 26-06-2015 jointly with the Sri Lanka Association for Improving Higher Education Effectiveness (SLAIHEE). There were 63 academics as participants from several state and private universities in Sri Lanka.

In addition to the CTHE and MaTE2015 courses, SDC conducted a Tamil Language Course and 15 different workshops for the university staff during the year 2015 with the contribution also from the resource persons outside SDC. These workshops were conducted to enhance and increase the capacity and skills of academic, administrative and support staff to carry out their duties and tasks effectively in order to meet the expected targets and objectives of the university.

2.10 National Education Research and Evaluation Centre (NEREC)

1. Vision

To improve education and training at national and regional level by undertaking research, evaluation, development, dissemination activities and provide education information services.

2. Mission

To establish an energetic, forward looking, educational research, evaluation, testing and training institution that has a national and regional profile.

Introduction

The National Education Research and Evaluation Center (NEREC) was established in year 2000 with the objective of providing research based findings for policy formulation. By virtue of its establishment, NEREC is committed to initiate and carry out research and evaluation studies pertaining to educational policy and student achievement in Sri Lanka. For more than a decade, NEREC has conducted national assessments of achievement of students completing various grades in consultation with the Ministry of Education (MoE) and the World Bank. The services of NEREC are available for both government and non-governmental organizations by way of seminars, workshops, capacity development training sessions and community dedicated to education research.

The study on the National Assessment of Achievement of Students Completing Gr. 08 in Year 2014 was completed and dissemination to the relevant stake holder including the officials of the Ministry of Education, National Institute of Education, National Education Commission and the World Bank took place on 10th August 2015 at the Faculty of Education. This project was commissioned by the Ministry of Education with the financial assistance provided by the World Bank.

Future Plans

At present a new national assessment is being carried out by NEREC for the year 2015/2016 on National Assessment of Achievement of Students Completing Grade 04 in Year 2015 in Sri Lanka. Ministry of Education requested for NEREC to conduct three studies research, related to education and evaluation. Thus, NEREC is committed to create a vibrant research

- 1. Increase of G.C.E. (A/L) results by 65% in 2017
- Increase number of students following in the G.C.E. (A/L) science stream up to 28% in 2017
- 3. Increase number of students following in the G.C.E.(A/L) commerce stream up to 33% in 2017

2.11HEALTH CENTRE

Medical Staff

Dr. K.D.I.Wasudeva works as Chief Medical officer. Dr.(Mrs.)M.A.P.W. Premathilake and Dr.(Mrs) A.R.P.Rathnayake work as University Medical officers on contract. There are three vacancies for University Medical officers and it has not been filled yet due to lack of applicants. Dr.(Mrs) D.S.K.Thennakoon was appointed as a University Medical officer on contract basis on 01.08.2015.

Technical staff

New pharmacist Mrs. N.Wijayanthi was appointed on contract basis on 02.03.2015.

Technical officer for the laboratory was transferred to University of Kelaniya and a new Technical officer to be appointed.

Services:

In addition to routine medical and dental treatment following are some additional services provided by the health center.

- All new entrants are given a medical questionnaire to be filled by their practitioners. The filled questionnaire and medical examination forms are filed at Health centre.
- All Medical students undergo a comprehensive Medical checkup by UMO.
- All new recruits to University services (University of Colombo /UGC/PGIM/IIM/Horana Sripalee) are examined by University Medical officer regarding fitness for duty and relevant investigations are done.
- Similarly all employees of these institutions are also examined for extension of service.
- Medical and fitness screening of students for special events of sports such as weight lifting, rowing, wrestling, Road races etc.
- The staff of UGC/PGIM/IIM is provided with health care facilities.

Public Health Service.

The spraying of insecticide to potential mosquito breeding places (as a routine public health services activity) is carried out. The problems of frequent blocks in the sewage system are resolved by obtaining the services of private contractors and the municipality when health centre sanitary laborers were unable do this jobs. A special program was carried out covering hostels, canteens and all University buildings during dengue epidemics. New fumigator machine was purchased to carry out fumigation work during dengue epidemic condition

2.12 THE LIBRARY

Vision Statement

To support the university's vision in building synergies between knowledge, education and research, by striving to create an environment conducive to learning, teaching and intellectual advancement.

Mission Statement

To underpin the mission of the university, by providing high quality service for the staff, students and the researchers to satisfy their quest for knowledge.

Brief Introduction:

The Library Network of University of Colombo consist of the Main Library, which is the hub of the network, and two branch libraries in the Faculties of Medicine and Science. The Main Library provides professional support on request, to the libraries in the Sripalee Campus and the Faculty of Graduate Studies.

Achievements:

Librarian post was filled from April 2015, after having Acting Librarians for nearly three and a half years. Utilising the Library Development Fund which consists mainly of the library fees paid by the postgraduate students of the Faculties of Arts, Education, Graduate Studies, Law and Management & Finance, the Main Library could purchase much needed computers for the Seminar Room and the E-Resources Room of the Main Library. Using this fund furniture for Learning Commons was also purchased. Five databases were provided by the UGC funded CONSAL for the second year.

Failure & Justification:

- Non-filling of 21 cadre vacant cadre positions, in Academic and other categories including 7
 labourer posts was a major drawback during the year considered and it is expected that all
 the vacancies will be filled in 2016.
- Long-standing issues related to Medical and Science library buildings have been a hindrance to the effective and efficient delivery of the services and it is expected that the University Maintenance Dept. will be able to sort the major issues, as soon as possible.

Future Plans:

- To offer a series of training programs for the Library Assistants to improve their IT skills
- To offer a short course in Information Management for the academic and administrative staff in collaboration with the Staff Development Centre.
- To obtain ISO Certification for the Main Library
- To improve the IT infrastructure of the Library Network, by soliciting funds from external sources, and to continue with the rehabilitation work of the Main Library and faculty library buildings.
- To fill the vacant cadre positions and to obtain several new cadre positions.
- To strengthen the Library Development Fund through fund raising activities.

Government and foreign funding are available for academics through processes of competitive application.

The University alsoallocated Rs. 45 million for the research grant. The University used the funds to award Postgraduate Research Scholarships, Collaborative Research Grants, Infrastructure Development Grants and Small Grants and to improve University and Faculty research promotional activities.

University Annual Research Symposium for the year 2015 was held successfully on 26th -30th October 2015 at the University of Colombo. Professor Tony Anghie, Professor of Law, University of Utah, United States of America was delivered the Keynote address on "Sovereignty and Challenges of Global Governance: A Sketch of Three Regimes". Mr Y .K Sinha, High Commissioner of India to Sri Lanka was the Chief Guest of the event. The Vice Chancellor, Deans of the Faculties the Registrar, Bursar and administrative staff, Head of Departments and the academic staff, and students were attended this occasion.

Faculties held their Faculty Research Symposia separately in conjunction with the University Research Symposium and a large number of papers were presented at the Symposia.

Research Forums

During the year under review Faculty of Management & Finance organized its 10th International Research Conference on Management and Finance in December 2015 successfully. The Conference created a unique platform for local authors to meet with their international counterparts to deliberate and debate their research papers in mutually beneficial atmosphere.

The second International Conference of the Faculty of Arts on theme "Changing Socio-Economic Dynamics in Sri Lanka: Contexts, Cultures and Imaginations" was held on 03^{rd} - 04^{th} December 2015.Prof. Naren Chitty from the Macquarie University, Sydney, Australia delivered the keynote address on the topic "Soft power, civic virtue and world politics —contexts, cultures and imaginations", and Prof. Rohan Bastin, from the Deakin University, New Delhi, India was the guest speaker who delivered his speech on the topic "it's 2015:Rethinking the social formation in a Neoliberal Context".

International Conference on Maternal and Child Nutrition, was held on 23 and 24 November, 2015 at the Kingsbury, Colombo which is jointly organized by the University of Colombo, South Asia Infant Feeding Research Network, UNICEF in collaboration with the Ministry of Health, Department of Foreign Affairs & Trade, Australian High Commission and the University of Sydney. This conference is chaired by Professor Michael Dibley from the University of Sydney and co-chaired by Dr. Upul Senarath, Senior Lecturer in Community Medicine and Dr. Renuka Jayatissa, Nutrition Specialist UNICEF.

DAY CARE CENTRE

CANTEENS

There are 12 canteens and 2 milk bars in the University. The University charges Rs.5000/- as monthly rental fee and Rs.5000/- for electricity use by each contractor.

PHOTOCOPY SERVICE

There are 08 no. of photocopy service at each faculty including Main Library. The University charges Rs.8000/- as monthly rental, Rs.5000/- as electricity per month and Rs.1500/- for an additional photocopy machine from each contractor.

All the building projects and the renovation and Improvement projects were monitored continuously by the Planning and Development Committee.

Main Buildings Projects and their current status

The construction of the 2nd Stage of the Pre-Clinical Department building complex (Construction up to first floor slab level excluding Auditorium) commenced in February 2014 and is expect to be completed by April 2016 at an investment of Rs.723mn for the Stage II. Balance Works of the same project which expects to be obtained cabinet approval in year 2016.

Stage II of the new Seven Storied Building Complex for the Faculty of Graduate Studies at an investment of Rs.228.6mn commenced its construction works in July 2014 and expect to be completed mid February 2016. Stage III of the same project which expects to be obtained cabinet approval in year 2016.

The Cabinet approval was received to award the construction work of "Facultyof Management and Finance East Wing" at the end of the year 2015. Accordingly, construction was commenced in November 2015 and it is progressing well. The investment for the project is Rs.111.4Mn.

The construction of the Extension to the Faculty of Education Building commenced in January 2015 and it is expect to be completed by March 2016 at an investment of Rs.113Mn.

The University prepared a new proposal for "Proposed Student Service Centre at Faculty of Science Premises" and submitted to the Department of National Planning through the University Grant Commission in the year 2014 and received the recommendation from Department of National Planning in the mid of the year 2015. University is awaiting the approval from the Cabinet of Ministers. The estimated investment for the project is Rs.468.3Mn.

The University prepared a new proposal for "Proposed Information and Learning Centre at Faculty of Science Premises" and submitted to the Department of National Planning through the University Grant Commission in the year 2014 and received the recommendation from Department of National Planning in the end of the year 2015. University is awaiting the approval from the Cabinet of Ministers. The estimated investment for the project is Rs. 850Mn.

The Project Proposal of "construction of Extension to the West Wing Building Faculty of Management & Finance" has been forwarded to the University Grants Commission (UGC) and University is awaiting the approval from the Cabinet of Ministers.

FINANCIAL REVIEW 2015

Reporting Entity

University of Colombo has been incorporated under the Universities Act No.16 of 1978. The main administration is located at the College House, No.94 CumaratungaMunidasaMawatha, Colombo 03. The Financial Statements of the University of Colombo are prepared for the year ending 31st December 2015.

The results for the year ended 31st December 2015 show the University had another successful year generating a surplus of Rs.326 Million.

Income

Total recurrent Grant for the University has increased by Rs.411 Million in 2015. Income from fee levying courses for the year 2015 is Rs.674 Million.

Expenditure

Expenditure increased during the year by 22% from Rs.1961 Million to Rs.2388 Million. Staff costs have increased by 27% from Rs.1480 Million to Rs.1880 Million reflecting incremental progression and national pay awards. Other operating expenses have increased by 6% from Rs.481Million to Rs.508 Million.

Capital Expenditure

During the year, the University has undertaken Capital Projects spending Rs.493 Million. Key projects include 14 story building of the Faculty of Medicine and building for Faculty of Graduate Studies, building of Faculty of Education and building for Faculty of Management & Finance. Expenditure on Building for Faculty of Graduate Studies has been funded by internally generated

funds as amounted to Rs.111 Million in the year.

World Bank Grant

Higher Education for the 21st Century (HETC) Grant has provided funds to increase IT, English and Soft skills of Undergraduate students and also in improvements of research and development of Postgraduate students. Rs.35 Million has been spent during the year 2015 and total grant amounted to Rs.162 Million.

Notes to the Financial Statements

University of Colombo

1. Reporting Entity

University of Colombo has been incorporated under the Universities Act No. 16 of 1978. The main administration is located at the College House, No. 94 Cumaratunge Munidasa Mawatha, Colombo 3. The Financial Statements of the University of Colombo are prepared for the year ending 31stDecember 2015.

2. Significant Accounting Policies

2.1 Basis of preparation

The Financial Statements of the University of Colombo are prepared under the Historical Cost convention in conformity with Sri Lanka Public Accounting Standards for the accrual basis of accounts. All accounting policies adopted by the University are applied consistently with those of the previous year, where necessary comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to the changes, in presentation of current year figures.

The Financial Statements do not include those of the university students' societies and Colombo Science & Technology Cell as it is a separate legal entity over which the University does not exercise control or significant influence over policy design.

2.2. Going concern

The Financial Statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

2.3 Events after the date of the Statement of Financial Position

All material events after the date of the Statement of Financial Position are considered and appropriate adjustments or disclosure made in the financial statements where necessary.

University of Colombo had established a company limited by guarantee under thename of Colombo Science & Technology Cell and the University received a sum of Rs.294,762.59 on 27.11.2015 as a university contribution for the year ended 31.03.2015.

3. Significant Accounting Policies

3.1 Property, Plant & Equipment

Lands, Buildings, Laboratory and Teaching Equipment, Fixtures & Fittings, Library Books and Periodicals, Motor Vehicles, Cloaks and Other Assets include the items acquired out of government grant, research grants, internally generated funds, and donations.

a) Basis of Recognition

Property, Plant and Equipment are recognized if it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the entity and the cost of the item can be reliably measured.

Equipment's are capitalized on the basis of nature. Equipment is capitalized if it is tangible, has a life of more than one year and has a purchase cost greater than Rs.2,500.00.The life of asset is dependent on its category within 10 categories, ranging from 4 to 20 years.

b) Revaluation of the Fixed Assets

Lands and Buildings of the University of Colombo & Sri Palee Campus were revalued as at 31.12.2013 on the basis of current market value for continuation of existing use where appropriate. Furniture and Office Equipment and Laboratory and Teaching Equipment have been revalued as at 31.12.2009 except Sri Palee Campus. Motor Vehicles of the University of Colombo & Sri Palee Campus were revalued as at 31.12.2010 and 31-12-2013 respectively by the Chief Valuer of the Department of Valuation. Assets revaluation surplus reserve carrying amount is Rs.38.87 Billion as at 31.12.2015. Deeds are not available for the following lands.

- 1. College House premises, No. 94, Cumarathunga Munidasa Mawatha, Colombo 03.
- 2. Premises of Faculty of Art & Faculty of Law.
- 3. Premises of Faculty of Management & Finance & Faculty of Education.

- 9. Premises of Faculty of Medicine, Norris Canal Road, Colombo 10.

Furniture & Office Equipment and Laboratory & Teaching Equipment of Sripalee Campus were revalued as at 01-01-2014 for Rs.19,125,378 and Rs.13,991,618 respectively by the Department of Revaluation.Rs.8,377,146 was credited to Revaluation Reserve on

Laboratory & Teaching Equipment and loss of Rs.4,855,995 was debited to Statement of Financial Performance of 2015.

c) Subsequent expenditure on existing Fixed Assets

Expenditure incurred on tangible fixed assets is charged to the Statement of Financial Performance in the period it is incurred, unless it meets one of the following criteria, in which case it is capitalized and depreciate on the relevant basis.

- Market value of fixed assets has subsequently increased.
- Asset capacity increase.
- Sustainable improvement in the quality of output or reduction in operating cost.
- Significant extension of the asset life beyond that confirmed by repair and maintenance.

d) Depreciation

Depreciation is recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on a Straight – Line Method over the estimated useful life of Property, Plant and Equipment items from the date that they were made available for use. Lands are not depreciated. The estimated useful life periods are as follows.

Depreciation is provided from the year of purchase and up to the year of sale based on the period used, with full depreciation being provided in the month of purchase and sale of assets.

e) Lease - Finance Lease

Leases in terms of which the University assumes substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership are classified as finance leases. On initial recognition, the leased assets under property, plant and equipment, is measured at an amount equal to the lower of its fair value and the present value of minimum lease payments. Subsequent to initial recognition, the asset is accounted for in accordance with the accounting policy applicable to that asset.

Minimum lease payments under finance leases are apportioned between the finance expense and the reduction of the outstanding liability. The finance expense is allocated to each period during the lease term so as to produce a constant periodic rate interest on the remaining balance of the liability.

Following balances have been included in Property, Plant and Equipment as at 31.12.2015.

g) Maintenance of Premises

The University has a maintenance plan which is periodically reviews and forms the basis of the on-going maintenance of the estate. The cost of maintenance is charged to the income and Expenditure Account as incurred.

h) Capital Works in Progress

Capital expenses incurred during the year which are not completed as at the date of the Statement of Financial Position are shown as Capital Work-in-Progress, whilst the capital assets which have been completed during the year and put to use have been transferred to Property, Plant and Equipment.

3.2 Inventories & Stocks

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realizable value. In general, cost is determined on a first-in-first-out basis and includes expenditure incurred in acquiring the inventories and bringing them to their existing condition and location.

3.3 Current Assets

Current Assets classified in the Balance Sheet are those which will be recovered within one year after the Statement of Financial Position date.

3.3.1 Cash in Hand

Cash & cash equivalents of Rs. 111,656,854.22 include Rs.182,098.65 received on 31-12-2015. Cash in hand has been deposited in the bank on 01-01-2016.

3.4 Receivables

A sum of Rs.36,019,234.23 is due from employees on account of breach of bonds and agreements as at 31.12.2015.

3.5 Current Liabilities

Liabilities classified as Current Liabilities in the Statement of Financial Position are those that fall due for payment within one year from the Statement of Financial Position date. All known liabilities have been accounted for in preparing the Financial Statements.

3.6 Provision for Gratuity

Provision has been made in the Financial Statements for retiring gratuities payable under the payment of Gratuity Act No. 12 of 1983, based on the amount payable if all employees retire on the date of the Statement of Financial Position, subject to the assumption that every employee would be entitled to the payment even if any or some of them may not have completed the minimum period of service required to be eligible for the payment under the Act on the date of the Statement of Financial Position.

3.7 Contingent Liabilities

No provision has been made in the accounts with regard to liabilities arising out of litigation. The total estimated amount of liabilities as at 31st December 2015 is Rs.6 million.

3.8 Income and Expenditure

3.8.1 Government Grants

Grants received from the General Treasury of the Government of Sri Lanka, and Tuition Fees received from the foreign and local students are recognized as income in the period in which the related costs are recognized.

Government grants utilized to acquire assets that will be expensed in subsequent period are recognized as deferred income. Government Grants represent by other assets including cash and cash equivalents less liability.

The total Capital Grants received for the year was Rs.615 Mn which has been used as follows:

3.8.2 Recognition of Revenue

(a) The Government Recurrent Grants are recognized in the period in which they were received. Non-recurrent grants from government or other bodies receivable in respect of the acquisition or construction of Fixed Assets are treated as deferred Capital grants and amortized in time with depreciation over the life of the assets.

All other income is credited to the Financial statement in the period in which is earned.

(b) Interest income received and receivable for the period is recorded as revenue in the Financial Statements as except for the investment income earned on externally restricted endowments, for which only the amount made available for spending is related as revenue. In the year where the investment income earned is in excess of the amount made available for spending, the excess is recorded as a direct increase in endowments.

(c) The fees on fee-levying courses recognized to the income statement based on the stage of completion of each course as at the end of the year. Lecture fees and payments relating to future periods are shown in the Statement of Financial Position as deferred income.

3.8.3 Higher Education for the 21st Century (HETC) Grant

HETC project has provided funds to increase IT, English and soft skill abilities of under graduate students and also in improvement of research and development of Post Graduate Students.

Financial contribution of HETC project for the year 2015 is given below. These expenses have not been included in the Financial Statements.

- (b) All expenditure incurred in the acquisition, or improvement of assets of a permanent nature in order to carry on or increase the learning capacity of the students has been treated as capital expenditure.
- (c) Expenses are recognized in the income statement on the basis of direct association between cost incurred in the running of the University and in maintaining the capital assets in a state of efficiency has been charged to revenue in arriving at the surplus/deficit for the year.

Report of the Auditor General on the Financial Statements of the University of Colombo for the year ended 31 December 2015 in terms of Section 108(1) of the Universities Act, No 16 of 1978.

The audit of financial statements of the University of Colombo for the year ended 31 December 2015 comprising the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2015 and the statement of financial performance, statement of changes in equity and cash flow statement for the year then ended and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information, was carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions in Article 154 (1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka read in conjunction with Section 13 (1) of the Finance Act, No.38 of 1971 and Sub-section 107 (5) of the Universities Act, No. 16 of 1978. My comments and observations which I consider should be published with the Annual Report of the University in terms of Section 108 (1) of the Universities Act, appear in this report. A detailed Report in terms of Section 108 (2) of the Universities Act, will be furnished to the Vice Chancellor of the University in due course.

1.2 Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards and for such internal control as the management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatements whether due to fraud or error.



1.3 Auditor's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on my audit. I conducted my audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards consistent with International Auditing Standards of Supreme Audit Institutions (ISSAI 1000 – 1810). Those Standards require that I comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgments, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatements of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the University's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the University's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. Section 111 of the Universities Act, No 16 of 1978 gives discretionary powers to the Auditor General to determine the scope and extent of the audit.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my audit opinion.

1.4 Basis for Qualified Opinion

My opinion is qualified based on the matters described in paragraph 2.2 of this report.

2. Financial Statements

2.1 Qualified Opinion

In my opinion, except for the effects of the matters described in paragraph 2:2 of this report, the financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the University of Colombo as at 31 December 2015 and its financial performance and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

2.2 Comments on Financial Statements

2.2.2 Failure to Disclosure the Related Party Transactions

Even though the approval of the Cabinet of Ministers should be obtained before the commencement of a company within the University, a limited by Guarantee Company named Colombo Science and Technology Cell had been registered under the Companies Act, in the year 2013. The Head Office of this Company had been housed in a building belonging to the Faculty of Science of the University of Colombo and the other physical and human resources including computer and accessories of the University had been utilized, whereas an agreement had not been entered into on the utilization of the property of the University. A sum of Rs.294,763 had been paid to the University in lieu of the utilization of the resources of the University.

2.2.3 Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 07

As the useful life of the non-current assets had not been reviewed annually in accordance with the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 07, assets costing Rs.611,787,370 were further being used despite being fully depreciated. Accordingly, action had not been taken to revise the estimated error in terms of the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 03.



2.2.4 Accounting Deficiencies

The following observations are made.

- (a) The value of the cancelled cheques should be credited to the income during the relevant year. Nevertheless, the cancelled cheques totalling Rs.177,723 of the Faculty of Graduate Studies had not been credited to the income and it had been credited to the Faculty Development Fund maintained by the Faculty during the year 2015.
- (b) Although the courses relating to 45 batches of students had been completed in the year 2014, instead of crediting the surplus income amounting to Rs.85,593,750 to the Accumulated Fund, a sum of Rs.31,353,952 had been credited to the Faculty Development Fund and the balance of Rs.54,239,798 had been brought to account as the deferred income.

2.2.5 Lack of Evidence for Audit

The evidence indicated against the following items of accounts had not been made available to audit.

3 Accounts Receivable and Payable

Even though the Festival Advance should be deducted from the salaries of the officers concerned within 10 months from the date of issue of the advances, the balance of advances amounting to Rs.179,100 granted before the year 2015 had not been recovered even by the end of the year of accounts and the matters relating to this failure to recover and the age analysis of the advances in arrears had not been furnished to audit.

2.4 Transactions not Supported by an Adequate Authority

The following observations are made.

- (a) Sums of Rs.2,060,300 and Rs.5,443,800 out of the income from the courses conducted by the University in the years 2014 and 2015 respectively had been paid to the officers of the Executive Grade of the University as Honorarium Payments in addition to the salaries and allowances approved by the University Grants Commission without proper approval of the General Treasury, Ministry of Higher Education or the University Grants Commission.
- (b) Even though the University Grants Commission or the Ministry of Finance or the Department of Public Enterprises had not granted approval by circulars for the payment of participation allowance to the members who participate in the Faculty Board meetings held by the University and the Academic Board meetings or the Faculty Board meetings held by the Faculty, a sum of Rs.1,106,217 had been paid in the year 2015 by the Faculty of Graduate Studies as participation allowance to the members of the Faculty Boards and the Academic Boards.
- (c) In addition to the salaries and allowances approved by the University Grants Commission, a sum of Rs.738,750 had been paid to 06 employees of the Faculty of Graduate Studies as allowances from the income of 13 courses conducted by the Faculty of Graduate Studies without the proper approval of



the General Treasury, Ministry of Higher Education or the University Grants Commission.

Out of the interest income received for the investments in fixed deposits, the (d) University had transferred a sum of Rs.25 million to a Medical Insurance Welfare Fund without proper approval.



Although the arrival and departure of all the academic and non-academic staff of the University should be recorded, arrival and leave of 703 academic officers could not be established and as such the accuracy of the salaries and allowances of Rs.1,232,701,445 could not be examined.



Circular Even though the provisions made from the Consolidated Fund should not be spent on the research expenditure, research assistance amounting to Rs.3,824,931 had been granted during the year under review out of the provisions made by the Consolidated Fund to the University.

(d) Financial Regulation of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka.

Financial Regulation 371

- (i) Although the grant of advances should solely be limited to the officers of the Staff Grade, advances totalling Rs.2,140,650 had been paid in 128 instances to 29 officers not in the Staff Grade.
- (ii) Although the advances should be settled immediately after the completion of the purpose for which it is granted, action had not been taken to settle the advances aggregating Rs. 2,707,277 granted in 15 instances despite the lapse of a periods from 34 days to 279 days from the grant of advances.



- (iii) Even though the advances should be paid only upon a properly forecasted expenditure estimate, advances had been granted without such estimate and as such advances amounting to Rs.460,625 had been granted in 23 instances in respect of expenditure of Rs.158,201.
- (e) Public Finance Circular No.03/2015 dated Although the maximum limit of advances 14 July 2015. can be granted at a time is Rs.100,000, the


Although the maximum limit of advances can be granted at a time is Rs.100,000, the University had granted advances raging from Rs.105,000 to Rs.300,000 in 17 instances surpassing the provisions in the Circular.

3. Financial Review

3.1 Financial Results

According to the financial statements presented, the operations of the University for the year ended 31 December 2015 had resulted in a surplus of Rs.326,038,151 as compared with the corresponding surplus of Rs. 372,221,037 for the preceding year, thus indicting a deterioration of Rs.46,182,886 in the financial results during the year under review as compared with the preceding year. Although the Government Grants had increased by Rs.467,055,692, the increase in the expenditure on salaries and wages by Rs.400,333,561 and overhead cost by Rs.130,653,265 had been the main reason for above deterioration of the financial result.

An analysis of the financial results of the year under review and the four preceding years revealed that, although 52 per cent decrease in the financial results of the University was shown in the year 2012 as compared with the year 2011, the surplus had ceaselessly increased in the years 2013 and 2014 and a slight decrease was shown



again in the year 2015. However, when taking into consideration the employees' remuneration, tax paid to the Government and the depreciation for the non-current assets, the contribution of the University had continuously increased from the year 2011 and it had been Rs.2,302,710,433 and Rs.2,629,543,494 in the years 2014 and 2015 respectively. Accordingly, the increase in the contribution during the year under review had been 14 per cent as compared with the year 2014.

4. Operating Review

4.1 Management Activities

The following observations are made

- (a) The SIDA SAREC Project initiated in the year 2003 had been completed in the year 2010. In terms of Clause 07 of the agreement relating to the project, if any balance exists after the completion of the agreed purpose, it should be given to the Government of Sweden. Nevertheless, the surplus of the project amounting to Rs.2,543,154 had been further retained by the University.
- (b) A post titled the Academic Director not included in the Approved Cadre of the Faculty had been created and allowances totalling Rs.165,000 at Rs.15,000 per month had been paid during the year under review. The written evidence on the duties assigned to the Lecturer for the payment of this allowance had not been made available.
- (c) The Registrar of the Faculty had obtained an allowance of Rs.210,000 during the year under review at Rs.35,000 per month by stating that he had supervised the building of the Faculty of Graduate Studies under construction. The payment had been made despite the non-submission of a report on the manner of supervision done and the observations made at such supervision by the Registrar.
- (d) Even though the Commissioner General of Examinations had informed the Registrar to take legal action in terms of the Public Examination Act, No.25 of



1968 and the Penal Cord against a person who serves in the University as a Computer Application Assistant for the preparation of faked certificate of examination results and inform him. Instead of taking legal action, he had been removed from the service and given approval for him to obtain the contribution from the University Provident Fund and the Employees Trust Fund.

(e) A sum of Rs.36,019,234 remained receivable from 31 lecturers who had breached the agreements and bonds by the end of the year under review and out of this balance, a sum of Rs.1,892,022 was due from 07 lecturers who had violated the agreements prior to the year 2010. Nevertheless, any steps whatsoever had not been taken against them. Further, the agreements entered into after the year 2010 incorporated a condition that, the money due in the agreements could be recovered from the University Provident Fund. Nevertheless, no action whatsoever had been taken to recover a sum of Rs.3,561,741 receivable from the Provident Funds of the lecturers concerned, notwithstanding the lapse of more than a period of 3 years from the violation of 2 agreements which included the above condition.

4.2 Underutilization of Funds

The following observations made.

- (a) Notwithstanding the existence of an opening balance of Rs.41,618,780 in the Government Grants Account, a sum of Rs.55,000,000 had been obtained from the General Treasury in order to incur an expenditure of Rs.28,404,075. It was observed that a balance of Rs.68,214,705 remained idle in that account as a result of taking action without a proper estimate.
- (b) Although a capital grant amounting to Rs.25,000,000 obtained for the Students Centered Education had been included in the capital expenditure during the year under review, only a sum of Rs.209,750 had been spent.
- (c) According to the agreement relating to the cleaning activities, the amount payable to the cleaning institution should be computed based on the rates



agreed to make the payments according to the number of employees involved in the cleaning activities and the number of days that the service was provided. Nevertheless, payments had been made without complying with that requirement and as such it was observed at the test check that a difference of Rs.1,124,240 existed between the amount payable per month in terms of the Cleaning Agreement of each Faculty and the amount paid.

- (d) Even though the lecturers who obtain the research assistance should complete their researches on the date specified in the research proposal and submit the final research report, the final research reports of 12 lecturers who had obtained research assistance totalling Rs.9,136,737 had not been submitted despite the lapse of one year since the last day specified for the submission of the final research report.
- (e) The loan balances remains receivable from 14 employees who had left the University Service on various grounds amounted to Rs.1,243,481 and legal action had not been taken to recover that loan balance which exist over long period ranging from 5 to 10 years.

4.3 Identified Losses

The physical verification of books carried out as at 31 December of the year under review revealed that, 27,367 books valued at Rs.3,292,524 had been misplaced. No action whatsoever had been taken on these books and any adjustment had not been made in the financial statements.

4.4 Staff Administration

While there were 362 vacancies in the approved cadre of the University, action had not been taken to fill those vacancies and 103 employees had been recruited on contract basis. Accordingly, salaries amounting to Rs.27,804,822 had been paid to them during the year under review. The contract period of most of the employees had exceeded 5 years.

Systems and Controls

Deficiencies in systems and controls observed during the course of audit were brought to the notice of the Vice Chancellor of the University from time to time. Special attention is needed in respect of the following areas of control.

(c)	According to the agreement relating to the cleaning activities, the amount payable to the cleaning institution should be computed based on the rates agreed to make the payments according to the number of employees involved in the cleaning activities and the number of days that the service was provided. Nevertheless, payments had been made without complying with that requirement and as such it was observed at the test check that a difference of Rs.1,124,240 existed between the amount payable per month in terms of the Cleaning Agreement of each Faculty and the amount paid.	Institutions for the sanitary and cleaning services are selected by calling for open tenders. Payments are made according to the Bill of Quantity presented by such institutions. The monthly bill has been prepared based on the prices quoted in the Bill of Quantity for each part of work by the institution. I would like to inform herein that we request the wages paid for the sanitary labourers for a day in order to deduct the wages from the monthly bill in respect of the employees who do not report for the service, but their payments are not made based on the days wages. Accordingly, the agreement pertaining to the sanitary and cleaning services has been amended on the instructions of the Senior Assistant Registrar/ Law. Accordingly, I would like to inform that the clause "Payments are made based on the Bill of Quantity" has been included in the service agreement.
(d)	Even though the lecturers who obtain the research assistance should complete their researches on the date specified in the research proposal and submit the final research report, the final research reports of 12 lecturers who had obtained research assistance totalling Rs.9,136,737 had not been submitted despite the lapse of one year since the last day specified for the submission of the final research report. According to the Circular No.876 of the Commission, the vacancies in the most of the posts of non-academic staff should be filled from among the applicants included in a name list sent by the Minister of Higher Education. Nevertheless, due to the reasons such as the delay in sending such name list, not satisfying the relevant qualifications by the applicants referred to in the name lists and not scoring adequate marks at the selection test and not demonstrating sufficient skills at the interview, practical issues crop up with regard to fill all the vacancies. Further, vacancies continuously occur simultaneous to filling the vacancies and as such it finds difficult to fill all the vacancies. As there are vacancies in various divisions, the trainees appointed for the practical trainings have been appointed on duty assigning basis on



The draft memorandum submitted by the University of Colombo to obtain covering approval of the Cabinet of Ministers for the Colombo Science and Technology Cell is submitted herewith (Annex V) for making necessary arrangements to submit the same to the Cabinet of Ministers for consideration.
